Marylanders took to the polls prior to and on November 5<sup>th</sup> to cast their votes in the 2024 General Election. This document provides a summary of the presumptive winners for those races, including brief biographies for non-incumbent candidates in open races. Please note this analysis reflects the unofficial results posted by the State Board of Elections on November 6, 2024 as of 6:00 a.m. with 99.97% of Election Day precinct reporting 59, prior to final certification.

The winners of the nine federal races will be sworn in as members of the 119<sup>th</sup> United States Congress on January 3, 2025. In accordance with the Charter of Baltimore City, the Mayor and Comptroller will be sworn in on Tuesday December 3, 2024. The Baltimore City Council and the City Council President will be sworn in on Thursday, December 5, 2024.

In November 2018, Angela Alsobrooks made history as the first woman elected as the Prince George's County Executive, a position she proudly holds as a lifelong Prince Georgian. Alsobrooks leads an administration focused on delivering a world-class education system, fostering safe communities, and driving economic growth to create jobs and opportunities for all residents. She prioritizes increasing the commercial tax base to ensure the provision of essential services to every resident.

Before assuming the role of County Executive, Alsobrooks was elected in 2010 as the County's State's Attorney, becoming the youngest and first woman to hold the position in Prince George's County's history. Under her leadership, prosecution rates saw significant improvement across various categories and remained steady during her tenure. She began her career as a Prince George's County Assistant State's Attorney in 1997, eventually becoming the County's first full-time prosecutor assigned to handle domestic violence cases.

Alsobrooks holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Public Policy from Duke University and a Juris Doctor from the University of Maryland School of Law. She is a member of the First Baptist Church of Glenarden and Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. She resides in Upper Marlboro and has one daughter.

John "Johnny O" Olszewski, Jr., is the 14<sup>th</sup> and current County Executive of Baltimore County, Maryland. Elected in 2018, Olszewski boast of leading a "bold and transformative change for creating a better and more progressive Baltimore County." In his first year, Olszewski passed legislation that prevents guns from falling into the hands of dangerous criminals by setting security standards for gun retailers. He closed an \$81 million budget deficit, while raising teacher pay and strengthening the County's historic commitment to school construction.

Olszewski is a lifelong Baltimore County resident, who began his political career when he was elected to the Maryland House of Delegates in 2006 at age 23. He was re-elected to represent District 6 and served in the House for nearly nine years.

During his time in the legislature, Olszewski served as the Chairman of the Baltimore County House Delegation. Olszewski's notable legislative accomplishments include mandating earned sick leave for employees, raising the minimum wage, and securing marriage equality. He served on the House Economic Matters Committee and chaired the subcommittee on Banking, Economic Development, Science and Technology. He has also served on Maryland's P-20 Leadership Council and the Maryland Business Climate Workgroup.

Before his election as Baltimore County Executive, Olszewski worked in the private sector at SAS Institute, where he partnered with governments to help prevent fraud, enhance public safety, improve program performance and enable greater transparency. Olszewski graduated from Sparrows Point High School and earned his undergraduate degree from Goucher College. He has a master's degree from The George Washington University and completed his Ph.D. in public policy from the University of Maryland Baltimore County.

First elected to the Maryland Senate in 2018, Senator Sarah Elfreth represents Annapolis and southern Anne Arundel County, and made history as the youngest woman ever elected to the Maryland Senate. Elfreth's legislative priorities span a wide range of areas, from environmental conservation to healthcare and education. Elfreth serves on the Budget & Taxation Committee where she Chairs the Subcommittee on Public Safety, Transportation, and Environment Subcommittee and is responsible for balancing and overseeing the budgets of over twenty departments and agencies. Additionally, Elfreth is one of two senators representing Maryland on the multi-state Chesapeake Bay Commission. She also serves as the Senate Chair of the Joint Committee on Program Open Space & Agricultural Land Preservation and the Joint Committee on the Chesapeake & Atlantic Coastal Bays Critical Area.

Prior to being elected, she spent her educational and professional career as an advocate for protecting the environment and expanding education opportunities. She spent four years as the Government Affairs Director of the National Aquarium in Baltimore. She then worked in the private sector as Director of University Projects for Margrave Strategies where she focused on economic development in university towns. Senator Elfreth graduated, magna cum laude, from Towson University and holds a master's degree in Public Policy from Johns Hopkins University.

April McClain-Delaney possesses over three decades of experience in media and technology. Her leadership background includes a 15-year tenure at Common Sense Media, where she specialized in children's online safety and media impact on well-being.

As Deputy Assistant Secretary for Communications in President Biden's Commerce Department, McClain-Delaney most recently worked to expand broadband access, promote digital equity, and address on-line harassment and abuse. She also spearheaded initiatives to further US competitiveness through innovation and bolster the security and resiliency of national networks, including that of the First Responder Network.

Prior to her work at Common Sense Media, McClain-Delaney served as Vice President and Director at Orion Network Systems. She also practiced law as an FCC attorney with Cohn & Marks and co-founded USAT, an international satellite-based Internet services company. McClain-Delaney is deeply committed to philanthropy and community service. She oversees the Delaney Family Foundation fund and serves on multiple boards, including those of the Children's Hospital Foundation and the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Washington Metropolitan Area. She is also a member of the Georgetown Law Board of Visitors.

Licensed to practice law in Washington, D.C. and New Jersey, McClain-Delaney is a Member of the Federal Communications Bar Association. She holds a bachelor's degree in communications from Northwestern University and a law degree from Georgetown Law Center. She is married to John Delaney, the previous 6<sup>th</sup> District Representative.



### ✓ Neil C. Parrott (49.84%)

Neil Parrott, a former, three-term member of the Maryland House of Delegates representing District 2A, began his career as a traffic engineer at the Maryland State Highway Administration. He then served as Deputy Director of Engineering at the Frederick, Maryland Department of Public Works before founding his consulting firm, Traffic Solutions Inc., upon moving to Western Maryland. Parrott ran unsuccessfully for the U.S. House of Representatives in Maryland's 6th congressional district in both the 2020 and 2022 elections, facing defeat to Democratic incumbent David Trone each time.

Councilmember Zeke Cohen, current Councilmember representing 1st District, grew up in Northampton, Massachusetts, the son of a social worker and a psychiatrist. At 18, he made the pivotal decision to move to pursue a degree in Political Science at Goucher College. After completing his undergraduate studies, Cohen joined Teach For America, dedicating himself to teaching middle school social studies in West Baltimore. He then pursued a Master's Degree in Public Policy from Johns Hopkins University, focusing on urban improvement. During his

graduate studies, Cohen established his own non-profit, “The Intersection,” aimed at empowering young people with skills to organize and civic leadership.

In April 2019, Cohen’s advocacy led to the introduction of the Gender-Inclusive Single-User Restroom bill, making a significant step towards ensuring safety and inclusivity for all in Baltimore by requiring gender-inclusive signage for single-user restrooms. The historic bill was signed into law at a Pride Parade, a first in Baltimore’s history. The following July, he introduced the Elijah Cummings Healing City Act, a pioneering legislation aimed at implementing trauma-responsive care in Baltimore, making it the first city in the nation to comprehensively address the issue. The bill, signed into law in February 2020, signifies a crucial milestone in Baltimore’s journey towards healing from the deep-seated scars of trauma, racism, and violence.

Cohen and his staff boast of working tirelessly to deliver world-class constituent services and to provide transparency throughout the process. Since entering office in 2016, his office has resolved over 2800 separate constituent requests for assistance. These include requests for help resolving water billing disputes, removing abandoned boats from vacant lots, and expediting the repair of broken streetlights. Cohen believes in the power of organized communities and in the past two years, his office created community-driven task forces on the topics of transportation and public safety.

Cohen, married with one child, calls Canton home and also owns a business in Highlandtown.

Mark Parker, a lifelong Baltimorean hailing from South Baltimore, has dedicated himself to both raising a family and serving as a public leader in Highlandtown since 2009. As the pastor of Breath of God Lutheran Church, he has helped transform both the congregation and the surrounding community. Under his guidance, the congregation spearheaded the establishment of the Highlandtown Preschool, a distinguished early childhood education program catering to 56 students, with a special focus on serving low-income and non-English-speaking families.

Beyond his pastoral duties, Parker has served on several boards and commissions, including the Southeast Community Development Corporation, the Hispanic Commission for the City of Baltimore, the Exchange Club of Highlandtown & Canton, and the Highlandtown Community Association. He has advocated for his community before the Maryland General Assembly, the Baltimore City Council, Planning Commission, Board of Municipal Zoning and Appeals, and Liquor Board. His collaborative efforts have extended to partnerships with local schools, Friends of Patterson Park, Banner Neighborhoods, the Creative Alliance, CASA de Maryland, Comité Latino, the Julie Community Center, and the Esperanza Center. Additionally, Parker has been involved in the Patterson Park Master Plan process and the Baltimore Highlands Master Plan process.

Parker's educational background includes Bachelor of Arts degrees in History and Government and Politics from the University of Maryland, a Master of Divinity from United Lutheran Seminary, and a Master of Nonprofit Management from The University of Baltimore. He is married with two children.
